Bible Reading: The Promise of the Holy Spirit (John 14:15-21)

¹⁵ 'If you love me, you will keep my commandments. ¹⁶ And I will ask the Father, and He will give you another Advocate, to be with you for ever.
¹⁷ This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees Him nor knows Him. You know Him, because He abides with you, and He will be in you.

¹⁸ 'I will not leave you orphaned; I am coming to you. ¹⁹ In a little while the world will no longer see me, but you will see me; because I live, you also will live. ²⁰ On that day you will know that I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you.

²¹ They who have my commandments and keep them are those who love me; and those who love me will be loved by my Father, and I will love them and reveal myself to them.'

Brief Reflection

Here is an ambiguous message - one of many church noticeboard bloopers! But I have no doubt

[Zechariah 8: 5]



St Martha's EC does not love to hurt people. They love to welcome and take good care for people who hurt. Jesus understood the challenge of living in an ambiguous world where, as the saying goes 'the waters are murky and hard to wade through'. And yet it's into this very world full of joy, troubles and uncertainty that He calls us to a deeper understanding of what it means to love and follow Him. He says, 'If you love me, you will keep my commandments'.

Now, I personally do not view this verse, as some do, as a conditional imperative statement. I do not hear Jesus saying, "If you really love me, you'd better keep

my commandments." Instead, like many other Christians, I hear and indeed respond to Jesus' invitation to follow His commands because I love Him. As one translation specialist suggests, 'It might be easier to grasp this verse if we translate that first word as "since" instead of "if." We would then hear better Jesus saying to us, "Since you love me, you will be keeping my commandments. Won't you, my beloved?"

But what commandments are Jesus referring to? Well, there are over 40 in the New Testament. They include repenting, following Him, rejoicing, letting our light shine, making disciples and loving our enemies. Another command, I mentioned recently (on Christian Aid Sunday) is, 'love one another, as I have loved you' (John 13:34). And it's that "as I have loved you" part that often gets us. How are we supposed to love others the way Christ loves; the way He showed incredible compassion, listened to all, respected all and, above all, laid down His life for all? It is simply not easy for us love as Jesus loved. But thankfully, He sent us a special gift - in the person of a helper, counsellor and advocate. He is the Holy Spirit who comes alongside us to comfort, strengthen, enrich, guide, direct, teach, encourage, rebuke, exhort and abide with us forever.

Note that Jesus calls the Holy Spirit our other advocate. We need Him with us, in us and around us, all the time. One man (*Nicholas Senz*) uses the picture and words below to illustrate why we need the Holy Spirit



Ever think of the Holy Spirit as your lawyer? If you know a bit about the devil, you should!

Also, in his book, Encounters with Jesus, theologian Tim Keller gives us this extremely helpful insight on the role of the Holy Spirit. He writes, 'Many people say that the Holy Spirit gives us power, and that's true, but how does He do that? Does He merely zap us with higher energy levels? No—by calling Him the other Advocate [or Helper], Jesus has given us the great clue to understanding how the empowering of the Holy Spirit works. The first Advocate [Jesus] is speaking to God for **you**, but the second Advocate [the Holy Spirit] **is** speaking to you for you'.

In other words, the Holy Spirit was sent to remind us about Christ and to empower us to live in the light of the gospel. He "speaks" to us both for our good and God's glory. Also, just as Jesus is our advocate before the Father, the Holy Spirit is our advocate before the world - with all its mess, uncertainty, craziness and

ambiguity. We need the Holy Spirit! We need Him to help us love one another as Jesus loves us. We need Him because the world does not recognize Jesus as Christ, and because of this, the world cannot see the Spirit of Truth. On the night before the crucifixion, Pilate asked Jesus, "What is truth?" (John 18:38), and Jesus didn't say a word. He didn't need to. The answer was standing right there, in front of Pilate. We need the Holy Spirit to help open eyes to see Jesus, to love Him and His people more and to make Him known, in word and through our actions. Amen.
