Bible Reading: Acts 1:6-11 The Ascension of Jesus

⁶ So when they had come together, they asked him, 'Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?' ⁷ He replied, 'It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. ⁸ But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.' ⁹ When he had said this, as they were watching, he

was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. ¹⁰ While he was going and they were gazing up towards heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. ¹¹ They said, 'Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up towards heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven.'

Brief Reflection

In our Gospel reading last Sunday (John 14:15-21), we heard Jesus' promise to give His followers another Advocate, the Spirit of truth. Today (three days after Ascension Day), we hear Jesus repeat this promise, shortly before His ascension. His followers who, hardly 50 days ago feared they had lost Him on Good Friday, now have to face the reality of life without Him. Jesus is leaving them, but He is not leaving them alone. **In fact, He is not leaving them at all.** He will be with them, closely and through the Holy Spirit (John 14:18-19).

In addition to His promise to send the Holy Spirit, we hear (in our reading today) Jesus entrusting His followers with the responsibility of carrying on His mission to establish the Kingdom of God here on earth. He says, '... **you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth**' (vs. 8). Notably, it is to this ordinary group of men and women (and, I should add, to others like you and me who have followed Jesus) that Jesus entrusts the Kingdom business of sharing the Good News of Jesus, in word and through deeds.

As Jesus' time on earth, in a human body, ends, the mission of His followers begins and involves the call and privileges to join the missionary God in His work here on earth. As Pope Francis rightly reminds us all, '**every follower of Christ** (*emphasis is mine*) is a missionary to the extent that **we** have experienced the love of God in Jesus'. We all have a message to share namely, that Jesus saves and heals and that, "at His ascension, Jesus Christ the son God 'entered Heaven and He keeps the door open for humanity to enter" (*Oswald Chambers*). Notably, and especially at this time, there is in the account of the ascension of Christ a message of comfort for all in church who worry about the future of our Church. Tim Keller (who I quoted last week) uses the following words to present this message very well to us, "Jesus controls all things for the church, and therefore we can face the world with peace in our hearts . . . He's at the right hand of God as the executive director of history, directing everything for the benefit of His Church..." To these and other words of comfort and hope, I say, Amen.
