St Nicholas Church, Sighthill Palm Sunday sufferin Jesus the you and 28 March 2021

On Palm Sunday we remember Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, riding on a donkey. This was a triumphal entry, but the events of Holy Week offer a stark reminder that this triumphal entry soon turned sour. There was no fairy tale ending; instead, the entry into Jerusalem was the prelude to Jesus's betrayal and death.

So, the transition from Palm Sunday into Holy Week provides (especially at this time) a place for us to bring to God our fear, restlessness, pain, failures, disappointed hopes and experience of betrayal. All of that is what Jesus experienced on the cross.

It is these experiences that are transformed by the celebration of resurrection on Easter Sunday. If Easter is to have any reality, then the services of Palm Sunday and Holy Week need to offer opportunities for reflection on difficult aspects of our life.

Call to worship and opening prayer

Leader: Gathered here, let each one of us in our hearts

step aside from the crowd to realise the treasures of this day, as we lay our worship before God who deserves our devotion. And in that devotion, let us sing "hosannah"! Welcome to Christ the King! Would we wave

aside all we have learned?

All: No, we take it up and lay it before God as an

offering.

Leader: Would we wave aside the challenges that lie

ahead?

All: No, we face them and lay our fears before God

for our blessing.

Leader: Would we wave aside the vision of love and

peace?

All: No, we will seize the day and follow Jesus on

the Way.

Rejoice, rejoice, you sons of Zion! Shout for joy, you daughters of Jerusalem! Look and see, your king is coming to you. He comes triumphant and victorious, yet humble and riding on a donkey.

Acclaimed by crowds and carolled by children, He moves from the peace of the countryside to the corridors of power. The Lord now will save his people, as a shepherd saves his flock from danger. Like precious stones in a crown, we will shine in God's own land.

As the people spread their coats and palm branches on the ground to welcome you into Jerusalem, so we welcome you into our lives this morning. King of Glory, King of Peace, Servant King, reign in our hearts and lives this day and all days, that we might praise your holy name. Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord Hosanna in the highest.

Almighty and ever living God, in Your tender love for the human race, You sent your Son - our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ to take upon Him our nature, and

suffer death upon the cross, giving us the example of His great humility. Mercifully grant that we may walk in the way of **H**is

suffering, and also share in His resurrection; through Jesus the Messiah, our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.



Psalm 118: 1-2, 19-23 'A Song of Victory'

O give thanks to the Lord, for He is good; His steadfast love endures for ever! Let Israel say, 'His steadfast love endures for ever.' Open to me the gates of righteousness, that I may enter through them and give thanks to the Lord. This is the gate of the Lord; the righteous shall enter through it. I thank You that You have answered me and have become my salvation. The stone that the builders rejected has become the chief cornerstone. This is the Lord's doing; it is marvellous in our eyes.



Brief Reflection

On Palm Sunday (aka Passion Sunday) we read the opening lines and the final section of Psalm 118, which celebrate God's faithfulness: "O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; his steadfast love endures for ever!" (v1) This Psalm resonates with wonder and thankfulness. It shows us how God has taken what no one else wanted and made something amazing.


It encourages us all to join in worship in language which resonates with Jesus's entrance into Jerusalem: "Open to me the gates of righteousness, that I may enter through them and give thanks to the Lord." It also has an underlying sense of transformation. Rabbi Daniel F. Polish points out that Like all Psalms, this Psalm describes things moving in one direction and then abruptly reversing themselves for the better ... It affirms that no matter what sloughs we may find ourselves in, there can be a reversal of fortune. The world can turn upside down and what is but a distant vision of contentment and joy can become our immediate

reality." Verse 22 is key to this reading: "The stone that the builders rejected has become the chief cornerstone." In Christian tradition, the stone that becomes the cornerstone is associated with Jesus Christ from a very early stage, including in words attributed to Christ Himself. Psalm 118 in this way points towards Jesus's trial, death and resurrection.

(Tom) Words of Institution

As we hear once again the words of Paul describing the Last Supper Jesus had with His friends before His arrest, trial and death, let us each feel a new commitment to journey with Jesus Christ, to face the music, to face hardships, disappointments, and even suffering and

harm for what is right. Hear the words Paul shared with the people of Corinth, explaining this mysterious and powerful gathering: For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when we was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until He comes.

When we share the bread, we share in the bread of life. When we drink from the cup, we share the cup of suffering.

On this first day of the week that is called "Holy Week," we thank you Jesus Christ for the courage to do your Father's will. Strengthen us through this meal to stand by you, to truly be your courageous body of the faithful, and, where necessary, to accept the risk and confrontation as elements of our faithfulness.
